## Yesterday! Nostalgia

**May 1967** – Register Rally a Near Success. Five of the six scheduled peaks were successfully climbed on May 21st. The black sheep was Chair Peak, whose summit was jealously guarded by the past winters snows. These were in the form of highly respected cornices overhanging the chimney route and steep, slabby rotten snow on the north ridge. The Chair party retreated and climbed the Tooth along with Ray Ways party, but via the northern slopes. Two other groups, including the U. of W., were on the narrow peak.

Jeff Coulhour led a rapid ascent of Denny Mt. Rodger Lyman took a team of hotshots up Lundin. Jim Masons party ascended the highest peak of the area, Mt. Snoqualmie. Clay Gatchel had his group up and down Guye Peak before breakfast. New summit registers were planted on four peaks.

**June 1958** - Alpiners Asked to Support "Arctic Wildlife Range Withdrawal". Fred Packard, of the National Parks Assn. sent the following telegram:

"Individual and organizational letters needed to support Secretary Seaton's 'Arctic Wildlife Range Withdrawal' in view of current protest from mining interests."

It is hoped that this area, located in the eastern portion of the Brooks Range, be designated as the first Arctic Wilderness Area. Since the land will be kept in its natural state, it will be an ideal grazing area for caribou, mountain sheep and other forms of animal life. Withdrawal will not mean the area will be closed to the public. On the contrary, it is for the use of the people. Camping, as well as hunting and fishing will be allowed in a true wilderness area.
